

Ron Brooks hanging nearly assembled VE-7 Bluebird in rafters of Hangar 1

This half scale model of the VE-7 Bluebird was created by the aircrew of Strike Fighter Squadron Two (VFA-2), Lemoore Naval Station, as a centerpiece to hang above the squadron during Strike Fighter Ball 2022 as part of a decorating competition.

The first VFA-2 VE-7 Bluebird flight off deck of the USS Langley on 17 October 1922.

The Greenie Board shown here is used to grade pilots of VFA-2 on their carrier landings. Acceptable landings are shown in green. A long row of greenies is what a pilot is trying to create. The Squadron's coffee mug board is part of the Espirit de corps at VFA-2. These boards hang at Lemoore. The old ones will go on display in Hangar 1.

Bluebird Donation From "Hometown" Fighter Squadron Now Graces Skies INSIDE Hangar 1



Vought VE-7 Fighter Aircraft 1/2 scale model (Suspended above)

Ron Brooks does his high-wire act again as replica VE-7 BLUEBIRD of the Navy's first ever fighter squadron from 1921 takes off on a long journey above the floor of Hangar 1 at Estrella Warbirds Museum.

This model was made by the aircrew of Strike Fighter Squadron Two (VFA-2), Lemoore Naval Station as a centerpiece to hang above the squadron during Strike Fighter Ball 2022 as part of a decorating competition. On 17 October 1922 Lieutenant Commander Virgil ("Squash") Griffin, Jr., United States Navy, made the first takeoff from an aircraft carrier of the U.S. Navy when he flew a Chance Vought VE-7 fighter from the deck of USS Langley. As a reminder of the VF-2's rich history the squadron to this day still displays a blue, white, and red "Langley stripe" similar to the markings used by the first aircraft that deployed aboard the carrier.

The Greenie Board

The Greenie Board hangs in the Ready Room aboard US Navy aircraft carriers. It is used to grade day and night carrier landings. The grades for each squadron member are posted for all to see. It is called a "Greenie Board" as pilots get a color coded token for each landing. The color for an above average landing is green. The best pilots have a string of green dots after their name. This Greenie Board was used by Strike Squadron Two (VFA-2) before being opted for a smaller one for easier carriage and setup aboard a confined carrier Ready Room.



The coffee mug board is another fighter spirit tool where aircrew can keep uniform mugs organized in a confined space such as aboard an aircraft carrier. Each aircrew would have a squadron mug with the squadron emblem hanging on the board for easy access. This tradition also exists within the Officer Club or O-Club where custom beer steins from all squadrons also hang.
