The Mustang was the brainchild of Lee Iacocca. While intended as a 1965 automobile, it was debuted on April 17th at the World's Fair in Flushing Meadows, New York. It was announced that it was to be the pacecar for the 1964 Indianapolis 500 on May 30, 1965. All Mustangs built between March, 1964 and August 17th, 1964 were considered "early 1965 models and became known as "1964 1/2 models."






In 1945, a Japanese Balloon Bomb Killed Six Americans, Five of Them Children, in Oregon
