Flight Safety Information

No.3 April 1993 By Bob Singleton Flight Safety Officer

We want to be responsible tenants at Paso Robles Airport. With that in mind I discussed Airport Flight Safety with Roger Oxborrow, Paso Robles Airport Manager. brought up three concerns for us and all pilots.

A. Landings and Takeoffs on Taxiways:

This is a violation of State Aviation Law and Airport Regulations. The Airport Manager cannot approve landings and T.O.'s from taxiways. Approval can only follow a complete environmental impact report and a review and modification of Airport Regulations. There are two exceptions:

- 1. Ultralights are permitted to land and T.O. on the East-West taxiway, (taxiway "E", the nearest one to our hangar).
- 2. Pilots can declare an **EMERGENCY** by transmission to state that they cannot land on the normal favorable wind runway due to adverse winds or other emergency conditions.
- Ground Vehicles on the Airport:

These vehicles are not permitted within 500 feet of a runway or allowed to cross a runway. This includes the SW end of runway 01. They are not allowed on taxiways. This is especially true on Taxiway E due to ultralight activity. By the rules, ground vehicles are permitted to operate within the above areas if:

- 1. Prior approval by Airport Manager
- 2. The vehicle has a rotating vellow light
- 3. The vehicle is escorted by the Airport Manager

C. Low Approach Procedure:

Aircraft are allowed a low approach right over the runway centerline below 500 feet IF THE CONDITIONS DEPICTED ON THE AIRPORT SAFETY AREA DRAWING EXIST.

If the conditions stated on the drawing do NOT exist; e.g. an aircraft on the ground but within the Runway Safety Area, the low approach aircraft must stay at least 500 feet above the runway.


D. Excessive Transmission on CTAF 123.0 MHz.

This will be a subject on a future Flight Safety Report.

Airport Safety Area



Low Approach Proceedure:

- Maintain Runway Centerline below 500' AGL
- Airspeed below 250 kts IAS
- NO other aircraft or persons within Runway Safety Area. 3000' Separation between aircraft in the traffic pattern
- Announce intentions on 123.0 MHz
- Slower aircraft in the pattern have right-of-way.

Uniforms

In order to foster the semi-military flavor of the CAF, (and after all, we ARE promoting the restoration and preservation of WW2 aircraft), it has been suggested that more colonels purchase and wear uniforms that are available from the Headquarters PX. It is almost a necessity that those who assigned duties on the field during the airshow, such as parking aircraft and other ramp assignments, be dressed appropriately, either in special flight suits as determined by the Ramp Boss or in regular flight suits or Class B or C uniforms.

Headquarters has two different flight suits available, one in fire retardant Nomex and the other a short sleeved cotton/polyester. The Class B and C uniforms consist of trousers and a shirt plus cap. (Those who already have military or other

appropriate flight suits obviously are welcome to wear them).

To give you an idea as to what's available we have assembled some rather dated material and pictures. At the moment, this is all that can found to look at Headquarters has not issued any new catalogs or brochures in the interest of keeping costs down. The price list was sent to us just last week, however, and while it may not be exactly up to date, at least you can get an idea as to what some of the uniforms look like and cost. Approximately twenty five copies of this information will be available at the meeting. It is suggested that you contact Headquarters at the number shown on the first page of the information packet and discuss with them exactly what you need. They are most helpful.
