Building Plans

Gregory C. Wooldridge Captain, U.S. Navy A Brief Biography

Captain Wooldridge, from Springfield, Illinois, graduated from Blackburn College in 1969 with a bachelor's degree in economics. He was commissioned an ensign in July 1970 after completing the Navy's Aviation Officer Candidate School and in November 1971 received his

wings of gold, designating him a naval aviator.

Captain Wooldridge's first assignment was as a flight instructor in Pensacola, Florida. From there he headed west to join Attack Squadron 122 for A-7E transition training. He then reported to Attack Squadron 25, "Fist of the Fleet", onboard the aircraft carrier USS RANGER (CV-61).

In April Captain Wooldridge was assigned to Attack Squadron 127 at NAS Lemoore, California, where he flew A-4 Skyhawks as an advisory pilot. He reported to Fleet Composite Squadron 5 at Cubi Point, Republic of the Phillipines, in January 1980, serving as Maintenance, Safety and Tactics Officer where he flew the A-4 as an advisory pilot there, as well as in many other countries in the Far East.

January 1983 found Captain Wooldridge back in Lemoore with the "Fighting Redcocks" of Attack Squadron 22 where he served as Maintenance and **Operations** Officer, later deploying to WESTPAC on the USS ENTERPRISE (CVN-85). From January 1985 to November 1987, he served as Flag Secretary to Commander Light Attack Wing, U.S. Pacific Fleet at NAS Lemoore. He then spent six months transitioning to the F/A-18 Hornet with Strike Fighter Squadron 125, the "Rough Raiders".

Captain Wooldridge was assigned as Executive Officer of Strike Fighter Squadron 195,

"Dambusters", in Yokosuka, Japan, in May 1988. He assumed command of the "Dambusters" in August 1989, making numerous deployments on the USS MIDWAY (CV-41).

In November of 1990 Captain Wooldridge assumed command and served as Flight Leader of the Blue Angels. This tour included a "first ever" U.S. military team flight demonstration over Moscow, Russia.

Captain Wooldridge has flown over 7,800 mishap-free flight awards His include various deployment and unit awards, as well the Meritorious Service Medal. Navy Commendation Medal and Navy Achievement Medal.

Captain Wooldridge is married to the former Anita Wright of Clovis, California. The family resides at NAS Lemoore. His two children, Matt and Ellyce, and two grandchildren, live in Springfield, Illinois.

Suggested Projects for Flights

It has been suggested that a list be prepared and run in the Newsletter monthly regarding extra jobs that could be done by those Flights looking for points for Flight of the Month and Year etc.

Obviously, the completion of these odd jobs would contribute tremendously to the improvement of various aspects of our physical plant, both inside and out, as well as in areas other than just the hangar alone.

Some ideas are as follows:

Landscaping at New Site

One of the requirements by the City at the new site is that we have some sort of landscaping along the fence on Dry Creek Road. They have even gone so far as to indicate what they would like to see and have indicated that they would like to see some results as soon as possible.

The initial requirement is not exactly burdensome. When the call went out for immediate "landscaping" volunteers the response was somewhat less than overwhelming, obviously because it sounded like we needed to "landscape" the whole area at one time.

This is not the fact at all. What is required are clumps of 3 or 4 Escalonius plants in five gallon can size and 2 Ceanothus plants on either side, in one gallon can size, at each of about 10 spots twenty to thirty feet apart along and inside the fence line.

George Netto has already volunteered his time on this project and it was proposed in the "projects" column that one of the Flights jump on this.

May we suggest that either George's Flight or one other call George and see what has to be done. The Hangar and Grounds committee would be glad to help. With any luck at all we could get these plants donated if we have our PIO take a picture or two and submit a short article to the local papers while they are being planted.

"Warbird Scene"

"Freedom Flight"

Update: A group of World War II enthusiasts have organized what will likely be the largest gathering of WWII aircraft since 1945 for a cross-country flight from Long Beach, CA to New York City in Late July to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the ending of WWII.

560 aircraft have pre-registered for this event to be held in late July. 300 of them are T-6's! The flight will overnight in 6 different "Host" cities where ceremonies

It is estimated some 10 million people will witness the celebration in New York which will include fly-overs of the Statue of Liberty. Sponsors across the country are being solicited for the different aircraft. (hope I can get that play pen in the airplane). More on this as it develops.

Auction in Africa:

The South African Air Force will be holding a much awaited auction in late February. Two C-54's and 3 T-6's will be sold. The S.A.A.F. is one of the last groups to operate these types. They are also reputed to be among the best maintained aircraft anywhere so I'm sure competition will be fierce.

We have been trying to analyze the route that 2 South Americans took last year when they flew their Fairchild 24W from South Africa to Oshkosh, Wisconsin, with the thought of duplicating it in one of these T-6's. A container would run over 10,000 dollars to the east coast.


