offered a number of recommendations for improvement.

Although our membership has increased from 120 to 148 members and the number of Colonels from 25 to 41 (due mostly to Obbie's hard work) with increased recognition from Headquarters, the Flight Leader program has not progressed as well as had been hoped.

A motion was made that:

- 2. A Staff member be appointed to be in charge of the Program.
- 3. The Flights be reworked with regard to members and procedures.
- 4. Make a new inventory of members skills and interests
- 5. The Flights be asked to assist with the hangar move.

The motion was passed.

(Obviously number 5 was a great success because there were a tremendous number of members present on Saturday who managed to move the entire hangar contents in one day!)

Col. Hal Chilton has volunteered to be the Staff member in charge and Col. Bruce Toomey will assist him with the details of the day to day operations of the program.

It was generally agreed that the Program is an excellent tool to further the purpose and goals of the organization.

Obviously, all of us are considered to be part of a labor

pool, as well as, in many cases, specialists in certain areas of particular expertise.

Every member is welcome to participate to whatever extent he or she desires and no one should feel any undue pressure. On the other hand, we want to make sure that someone just doesn't fall between the cracks because he or she is uninformed as to what's available that might be of interest to him or her personally.

It is the intention of those who are taking the responsibility for the program to make it worthwhile, pleasant to participate in and a method by which every member can be made to feel comfortable with his or her participation, whether it be heavy involvement or just as a social member.

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#### Additional New Business

Col. Singleton indicated that Nancy Green, who has been conducting the monthly meeting raffle, has been concerned that the raffle was slipping in popularity.

Although we netted only \$63.00 at the October meeting, which was not as good as other months, it was definitely agreed that the raffle is well worth it and worth supporting. It is one easy way to raise some money fairly painlessly.

It was also suggested that we might solicit donated gifts like a free dinner for two to add to the raffle. In any event, the Staff was unanimous in their praise and support of the excellent job Nancy and her crew have been performing.

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


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
