Our program for the evening has a most interesting background. At one point, soon after the A-6 had been delivered, a gentleman was observed at the hangar giving the plane a very close

inspection. He talked with Bob Foote for a time, who was out there working on his own plane, and then left soon after.

The follow-up to the story is told below in the gentleman's own words in the form of a letter given to the Editor:

There is a connection between an airplane located on the apron behind the CAF hangar and Los Osos resident, Ron Mullisen. The airplane is an A-6E Intruder, Bureau Number 154171, just recently flown-in, decommissioned on the spot by the U.S. Navy and donate to the Confederate Air Force, Estrella Squadron at the Paso Robles Airport. (Actually to the Estrella Warbirds Museum, ed.) Ron Mullisen is a Cal Polv mechanical engineering Professor married to Claire Mullisen who both have two high school children.

The connection is that Mullisen flew this particular A-6 twenty three years ago while he was attached to Marine Corps Attack Squadron 242 at El Toro Marine Corps Air Station in Orange County, California. First Lieutenant (at the time) Mullisen's Aviator Log Book shows that he flew this aircraft ten times out of El Toro.

Ron was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Marine Corps in 1969 after he graduated from Cal Poly. He reported directly to the Navel Flight School, earned his gold wings and was selected to fly he A-6 which included a one year tour in Vietnam. After leaving the Marines he continued with his education and received his Ph.D. from Colorado State University. Ron has teaching mechanical engineering at Cal Poly for the past 16 years. His talk for the January 2nd meeting is entitled "Flying the A-6 in Vietnam."

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This will be a most interesting program and one really close to home in many ways. Please try to be at our first meeting of the New Year in our own Hangar.

CAF Staff Meeting Report

(Because of the Holidays there has not been enough time to formally prepare the minutes of the December Staff meeting for publication. The following are merely pertinent excerpts from the meeting notes for the information of the membership).

Confederate Air Force, Estrella Squadron Staff Meeting, December 20, 1995.

Col. Bob Miller purchased a stove with top burners for the kitchen at an excellent price to be used to augment the other which has been giving us some trouble. Since the purchase was made before approval was granted by the Staff, Col. Miller offered to pay for the stove himself. Several members felt that this was an undue hardship on Col. Miller because the stove is a definite necessity so they have made arrangements to repay him themselves between on donation basis.

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In view of the fact that we did not get the assignment of the L-4 from Headquarters several other ideas were presented. (These will be discussed in the newsletter in greater detail than space permits here).

well as the possibility of temporary multiple space heaters from Taylor Rents for the next few months.

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The subject of tools for use by the possible restoration groups or others connected to the Squadron was discussed. Col. Singleton of the L-16 group suggested that their group might be willing to donate what tools they still have left if one or more satisfactory tool boxes could be obtained since the one they are currently using belongs to Col. Bob Miller who needs to have it returned. It was decided to ask for possible donations of one or more tool boxes by the membership.

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The Staff agreed to accept the request that the privately owned L-2 be hangared in the CAF Hangar in exchange for the normal rental fee for such aircraft.

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The Staff agreed to allow the Museum to hold an auction in the Hangar, at a future date, as a fund raiser in place of a regular CAF program which would normally include a speaker. It was envisioned that the auction could possibly attract a number of additional "outside" people to the dinner which would be put on, as always, by the CAF which would reap the benefits of an enlarged dinner "take".

The Meeting was adjourned at 9:07 pm

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The Beech Project

Mention was made in a previous newsletter regarding the status of the twin Beech and the fact that the Staff had decided to drop the project and sell the aircraft to Col. Tom Leatherwood, who had originally put up the acquisition money. This decision was made after a thorough discussion of the pros and cons.

While the initial enthusiasm for the project was shared by nearly everyone, it was obvious that when the time came for the membership to put up even the original acquisition funds to reimburse Col. Leatherwood, the realities of the project became somewhat more apparent. There was barely enough raised to reimburse Col. Leatherwood and there were those who had pledged who never did put up the promised funds (including the

writer, I regret to admit) for one reason or another.

It soon became apparent that was some additional misunderstanding between various factions as to the amount of time and money it would take to restore the aircraft. There were those who thought it should be completed within a year or a little more and there were those who thought of it as along term project taking, perhaps, as much as 5 years. It was felt by many that those who were opting for the short did term understand that this was a voluntary project, supported and manned by a group of more or less untrained individuals and that the group as a whole was far from being able to put up \$75,000 or more in a short period of time to complete a restoration. It was also noted by many that we were in the throes of building the new installation which, in itself, was a mammoth project and, as is the case in any voluntary group, being accomplished by the Herculean efforts of a very few.

It soon became apparent that the Beech Project was being pretty much ignored with everything else going on AND with the obvious prospect of even more construction and volunteer work being necessary to meet the requirements of the City at the new site.

In any event, Col. Leatherwood was contacted to see if he would be interested in taking the aircraft back, which he

graciously agreed to do and those who donated funds were also contacted with regard to the return of their donations. There were those who wished to have the funds returned while others offered to leave theirs in a "pool' so to speak, for the possible purchase of other projects.

The Staff, therefore, decided that our interests would be best served if we concentrated on the more pressing projects currently "in the works" instead of a project the size of the Beech restoration. Consequently, the aircraft was sold to Col. Leatherwood who, obviously, has a keen interest in twin Beeches in general and was willing to accept the aircraft.

Other Project Possibilities

The Squadron Staff is well aware of the fact that the main purpose of the CAF is to restore aircraft and they are equally aware of the interest that many have shown in this regard.

Currently, there are several aircraft in Midland that are up for assignment including two Cessna UC-78s or Bobcats (or Bamboo Bombers, if you prefer) as well as others. There is also the Navion project that is currently in storage here in Paso Robles.

Without touting either the virtues or problems of these or any other particular aircraft, obviously there are other choices for future restoration.

Perhaps it would be better for us to wait until other aircraft are available from Midland and then bid on one of those. It might also make better sense for us to bid on an airplane that is already in flying condition and then merely keep it up rather than take on a full restoration.

The Staff would be most interested to hear the opinions of the membership with regard to any aircraft project, keeping in mind the availability and

practicality of any particular aircraft. Please give this some thought, discuss it among yourselves and let any Staff member know how you feel about it. This will go a long way toward getting us all involved in a meaningful and achievable project.

Flight Leader Program


