### **Speaking Of Elections**


As you know, the timing for election of officers was changed to coincide with our fiscal year so we are looking at the first of the year for the installation of new officers.

#### Al Schade, Biographical Outline

Enlisted in the Marine Corps. shortly after the Pearl Harbor bombing and served four years in the Central Pacific as a gunner in a Douglas SBD dive bomber. Discharged in 1946 and for several years was flying for Kerrville, Texas Flying Service as a commercial charter pilot. flight instructor and ground instructor

Moved to California in 1948 and was in business at Orange County Airport (John Wayne Airport) teaching flying and converting military aircraft. General aviation took a major slump in 1950 so folded the business and hired on with North American Aviation in May 1950.

Called back into the Marines in August, 1950 and served a year in combat flying L-5 spotter planes among other duties.

Returned to North American Aviation in September, 1951 and joined the aerophysics laboratory operations. This was the beginning of the Navajo Program which was one of the most sophisticated research and development programs of the period.

Remained with North American for 32 years as a project engineer on the GAM-77 Houndog Program, the

Apollo Program and the Space Shuttle Program. Was assigned as the responsible project engineer on the Challenger Space Shuttle, a 10 year exercise. Retired from North American in January, 1982.

Hold commercial flight instructor license with instrument and multi-engine

instructor license with instrument and multi-engine rating, ground instruction rating and am a licensed A & P.

#### New Taxiway Reflector Already Broken

As most of you who fly are aware, the reflectors have all been replaced along taxiway "F" with new ones in the new blue color mandated by the FAA. Not only that, the FAA was kind enough to fund most of this and, consequently, are more than somewhat aware of damages incurred .We have noticed that the one at the end of our area has already been

hit, within the last few days, and would like to suggest, again, that those who drive their automobiles out of or into our paved area, keep in mind that the taxiways are for airplanes, NOT automobiles.

informed rather was The writer pointedly that the police department has been notified by the City administration that the issuance of citations is already provided for in the city ordinances for those who trespass onto the taxiways and aprons.
