

A Brief Biographical Sketch of Our XO Nominee.

It is an honor for me to accept the nomination from the Nominating Committee for the position of Executive Officer for the coming year. Accordingly, I have been asked to provide a brief biographical sketch for the newsletter and I am happy to do so.

My association with the Estrella Squadron started two years ago when this unit invited me to give a talk on the A-6 parked out on the apron, A check with my Aviator Log Book revealed that I had flown this particular A-6 twenty-five years ago while I was a First Lieutenant attached to Marine Corps Attack Squadron 242 at El Toro Marine Corps Air Station in Orange County, California. After my talk I was received very warmly so I joined the CAF.

My aviation experience spanned a brief but intense 4.5 year period in the Marines. However, I still love flying and I still love airplanes and I intend to get back in the business. But, back to my biographical sketch which is the object of this column. In June 1969 I graduated from Cal Poly with a B.S. in mechanical engineering and commissioned a second lieutenant in the Marines the same day. I reported directly to Navy Flight School, earned my gold wings and was selected to fly the A-6. During 1972-1973 I was stationed in Thailand with Marine attack Squadron 533, the "Hawks." During the day we were flying into

South Vietnam and at night we were going into North Vietnam. Our Squadron lost three out of 12 airplanes. Five aircrew members were lost and one was repatriated after 7 months as a P.O.W. I flew 83 missions and earned 5 air Medals. It was the most exciting and dangerous year in my life.

Shortly after leaving the Marines, a buddy and I purchased a 24 foot sail boat and sailed down to Guadeloupe Island in Mexico. After returning, it was time to get serious about a career so I continued with my education and received a Ph.D. from Colorado State University. I have been at Cal Poly ever since and am a professor in the Mechanical Engineering Department where my specialty is in heat transfer, thermodynamics and fluid mechanics.

My wife, Claire, is a dental hygienist and an excellent artist (she did a water color painting of our hangar which appears on our web page). We have two great kids. Luke is a sophomore biology major at Poly. Emily is a high school senior studying in Salerno, Italy.

F-86 On The Lot!
