What's Going On?


What's going on? We have more things going on than ever!! The F-86 is on the gear, the wings are on and the tail feathers will be installed as soon as we get one more part.

Charles L. Miller Heads Up '98 Air Show

With the departure of Blake Wideman, Jeff Welles and Hal Chilton we sort of had much of the Air Show management staff nucleus yanked out from under us.

By a very fortunate coincidence we were able to avail ourselves of the services of Charles L. "Chuck" Miller to take over the Chairmanship of the Air Show.

Now, just because most of us haven't known Chuck there has been a lot of conjecturing as to just who he is. Well, let me assure you, this guy is not someone who just fell off the turnip truck as it passed through Paso Robles!!

From the time Chuck enlisted in the Army Air Corps at age SIXTEEN until his retirement from the Army in 1972 as a Lieutenant Colonel with over 7000

hours as an Airline Transport Pilot in aircraft and multi-engine pilot helicopters. commercial in Chuck's background is so varied and complex that we have found it almost impossible to condense for newsletter. As a result we will print out just the highlights which is kind of too because the details had fascinating. In addition to his military career, Chuck was also the manager of the Paso Robles Airport for 12 years starting in 1973 and was responsible for a number of air shows which drew from 3,000 to over 28,000 spectators with top performers such as the Blue Angels, the Thunderbirds and many civilian notables.

Now, we have struggled and worked hard for a number of years ourselves to put on our own air shows and we have come up with some questionably successful and workable systems. Chuck, on the other hand has some other ideas, born of experience, along with some of the ones we have used, and since he has volunteered to take on the management of the show this year, it is my firm belief that we should have an open mind and listen to his ideas, work them out and then line up behind him and do everything we can to help him make a success of this '98 show. If we don't we will only be hurting ourselves!!

Chuck has several ideas that are quite different from those we have implemented in the past. As an air show worker (beginning weeks before the actual show) I am 100% in favor of most of them and only question the "how" on a couple of them because of a lack of manpower.
