A brief biography of Col. Miller appears on page three.



Brief Biography of Lt. Col. Charles Miller

Chuck Miller was born in Corvallis, Oregon in 1930 where his father was a logger. One of six children, Chuck joined the U.S. Army Air Corps, at the

age of 16 following the loss of both parents. Assigned to Crane and Shovel school, Chuck was shipped to Guam after the course ended. Chuck was promoted to Buck Sergeant 10 days after his 17th birthday. After his discharge in 1949, Chuck and a friend traveled around the U.S. working at odd jobs until the fall when Chuck entered the University of Oregon. In January of 1951 he reenlisted for Army Airborne and was assigned to the 11th ABN Division at Ft. Campbell as a Heavy Equipment Platoon Sergeant with the 127th ABN Engineers. In January of 1954 after completing his hitch, Chuck went back to Oregon just long enough to decide he really wanted to make a career in the military. Four months later in April of 1954, Chuck reenlisted and was sent back to the 11th ABN Division at Ft. Campbell, KY. He applied for Officers Candidate School and completed the Artillery Officers School at Ft. Sill, OK where he was in the top 5% of his class. Because of his high scores Chuck was allowed to change branches and switched to the Army Corps of Engineers.

In 1957 Miller completed Army Flight Training and was assigned to the 82nd Airborne Division. In 1959 Chuck was assigned to the 30th Topographical Survey Battalion and was sent TDY to Iran for a year. Returning to the U.S. in 1960 Miller was assigned to ground duty at Ft. Belvoir, VA as a Company Commander and later as the Battalion Commander of the 2nd Battalion of Engineer Center Regiment. Completing the Engineer Officers Advanced Course, Miller was assigned Mediterranean Engineer Division in Livorno, Italy as a pilot and Area Engineer. The Division was responsible for all construction for Southern Europe, all of Africa and the Middle East as far as Rangoon. During his three assignment Miller traveled extensively to 63 countries.

Miller had two tours in Vietnam, the first being in 1966 with the 1/9 CAV, First Air Cavalry Division where he was the Scout Platoon Leader and Troop Commander. Returning home he was transferred to Presidio, San Francisco as the Senior Arm Engineer Advisor to the California National Guard. His second tour to Vietnam in 1970 was with the First Aviation Brigade as Airfield Commander at Dong Tam in the Delta and then at Marble Mountain, Da Nang.

Chuck retired in May 1972 as a Lt.. Colonel with 24 years of active duty at the age of 41. Chuck married his wife, Betty Renton, in September of 1972. Miller worked as a Construction Superintendent for Dart Industries and flew for a period as a commuter pilot with Swift Airlines out of San Luis Obispo before going to work for the City of Paso Robles as the Airport Manager when the city acquired the airport from the County of San Luis Obispo in 1973.

As the Airport Manager, Miller was instrumental in getting the airport subdivided into separate leasable parcels for an Industrial park and Aviation uses.

Miller started the first Annual Paso Robles Airshow in September of 1973 to show the citizens of the North County what they had acquired for \$1.00 and to attract business people to the airport. From the initial crowd of 3,000, Miller averaged 10,000 persons in attendance during the 12 years he was the Airport Manager, with such acts as Bob Hoover, Art Scholl, the USAF Thunderbirds and the USN Blue Angeles. The largest crowd was in 1983 with 27,000 people. Chuck retired from the City in 1983 and after building custom homes in the Camarillo area, traveled extensively around the United States in a motor home with Betty. The Millers relocated to Bend, Oregon in 1992 where they owned a small farm and lived there where Chuck served on the Board of for the Central Oregon Airshow for four years and Betty worked at an Interior Design Studio. Moving back to Atascadero in 1997, Chuck got back into putting on the Paso Robles Airshow in 1998 and 1999.

Chuck holds Master Aviator Wings and has over 7,000 hours of fixed wing and rotary wing time. He is also a Senior Parachutist.

Some of his Military Awards include:

Distinguished Flying Cross; Bronze Star Medal with 2 Oak Leaf Clusters; Meritorious Service Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster; the Army Commendation Medal; the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with Palm; the Vietnamese Civil Action Honor Medal 1st Class as well as numerous other awards.
