

Born in Pittsburgh, PA he grew up in the western suburbs of Cleveland, Ohio where he learned to fly while still

in high school. He worked briefly for NACA before enlisting in the Navy, too late to qualify for WWII flight training. During the late forties and early fifties Ray divided his time between attending UCLA and working as a flight instructor, charter pilot and mechanic at small airports in northern Ohio.

After four years of mockup and flightline work on the F-94C and Constellation and with a short stint in Engineering, Ray was asked if he would like to work in the Skunk Works. His affirmative response was a momentous career decision. The Lockheed job was no longer temporary

Over the next 32 years as a "beancounter" Ray was involved in every Skunk Works program and worked his way up to become Assistant General Manager and number two man under Ben Rich during the development and production of the F-117A. Ray's close association with Kelly Johnson and the men who followed him as heads of the Skunk Works provided an unforgettable experience of a lifetime.


