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

Brief Biography of Lieutenant Commander Thomas R. Harrington.

A native of Paso Robles. California, Lieutenant Commander Harrington graduated from California Polytechnic State University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration in 1988. After completing Aviation Officer Candidate School (AOCS) and flight training in Pensacola, Florida and Corpus Christi, Texas, he reported on July 1990 to Helicopter Anti-Submarine Squadron (light) FORTY ONE in San Diego. California for training in the Sikorsky SH-60B Light Airborne Multi-Purpose System (LAMPS) helicopter.

In April 1991 he reported to Helicopter Anti-Submarine Squadron (Light) FORTY FIVE also in San Diego. While at HSL-45 he completed deployments aboard USS FIFE (DD-991) and a Desert Storm deployment in USS ANTIETAM (CG-54). His duties included: Detachment Administrative Officer, Tactic

Officer, Detachment Maintenance Officer, Public Affairs Officer, Aircrew Division Officer and Aircraft Division Officer.

In October 1994, he accepted an assignment as an instructor at Boston University-MIT NROTC. While in Boston he taught Navigation and History courses in addition to service as Senior class advisor and acting Executive Officer.

Leaving active duty in 1997, Lieutenant Commander Harrington continues to be active in the Naval Reserve as a pilot at Helicopter Combat Support (Special Mission) Squadron FIVE based at Point Mugu, California. He received his California Teaching Credential from Chapman University in 1999 and currently teaches in the Social Science Department at Paso Robles High School.

Lieutenant Commander Harrington is married to the former Ione Murray of New Orleans, Louisiana. The Harringtons have two daughters, Lauren and Taylor, and currently reside in Paso Robles, California.

Minutes of the Board of Directors Meeting - Estrella Warbird Museum

June 21, 2000 Meeting called to order by Chairman, Glen Thomson

Present: Atkinson, Clark, Cromwell, Gleim (advisory member), Marrett, Martin, Miller E., Miller C, Russell, Schade, Thomson, Toomey & Wright.

Absent: Chidlaw, Corippo

1. Reading of the Minutes, Treasurer's Report and all other reports were waived. 2. The Paso Robles Chapter of the EAA is starting up again and has requested the use of the Museum facilities. Chuck Miller moved to allow the EAA use of the facilities and John Cromwell seconded. Motion passed.

- 3. Marty Wright reported on his meetings with various local trade unions regarding the installation and completion of the Museum's kitchen ventilation system and the sprinkler system. Various union heads will be coming up to the Museum to inspect the building and review the project. Marty will report back to the Board at the next meeting.
- 4. Chairman Thomson discussed the ongoing issue of taking the F-4 cockpit to Southern California homeshows. Previous trips to the homeshows have proven time consuming and unprofitable. The Museum presently has no volunteer to take the cockpit to the July 7, 8 and 9 homeshow in Long Beach. Unless the home shows become more profitable and worth the effort, the Museum may have to stop attending.

Obbie Atkinson reported that the July 4th BBQ in the Paso Robles City Park should be a good value for the cockpit.

5. A 1942 Fire Truck has been offered to the Museum through Dave Geiger. Various board members have inspected the truck and reported that it is in good condition. It was agreed that the truck would be a good addition to the Museum collection. Conrad Martin moved that the Museum accept the donation and Al Davis seconded. Motion passed.

Other Business

- 1. Chairman Thomson has donated a 1985 Chrysler New Yorker to the Museum. Obbie Atkinson is presently working on ways to either sell the car on behalf of the Museum or perhaps raffle the car.
- 2. Marty Wright and Betty Miller discussed donation procedures/loan procedures the Museum needs to follow in order to keep track of items donated. Appropriate forms are kept by the log book.
- 3. Betty and Chuck Miller gave an informal status report on the USO Show. The Board first commended Betty and Chuck for their tremendous effort and long hours they spent preparing for the Show Betty reported unofficially that gross income from the Show was \$23,132. She will not be able to report the Show's net until all the bills have come in. Betty also noted that the Museum has left over soda. wine and beer that the Museum will be able to sell in the future as well as left over food items that are frozen and will also be used in the future.
- 4. Bill Russell revisited the CASA insurance issue. Because of past miscommunications. Bill asked for the Board's authorization to directly deal with the insurance in the future and to have the authority to choose the insurance broker of record. Chairman Thomson recommended that we revisit the issue closer to the time when the CASA insurance comes due.
- 5. Errors and Omissions insurance was discussed regarding Al Schade. It was agreed that the Museum should be covering Al Schade

- personally for his work performed on Museum aircraft. Chairman Thomson will investigate cost and report back to the Board.
- 6. Marty Wright reported that his parents-in-law will donate a photo copy machine to the Museum once it is repaired.
- 7. Admiral Gleim discussed the proposed housing development southwest of the airport that is presently being considered by the City Council. He strongly encouraged members to make their presence known at any City Council meeting or any other meeting in which this issue is being considered.

There being no more business to come before the Board, the meeting was adjourned.

Hangar Alarm

Those of you who are in and out of the Museum hangar day in and day out are usually pretty good about setting the alarm properly. There is one little problem however that I would like to address. If the side door (the one with the padlock) is not properly latched i.e., pushed in until the latch clicks, the padlock will not hold the door closed tightly enough to keep the alarm from going off if there is any sort of a wind. Lately, with the winds we have been having the door has rattled enough, if not latched all the way, so that the alarm goes off and I am then called by the alarm company and have to make a trip to the hangar to see if someone is breaking in or whatever else is going on. I don't mind if it's once in a while but I have been called four times in the last seven days, two of which were at 3:30am and 4:10am and this is just not my idea of a good time when it really isn't necessary. On all four occasions I have checked the door before I open the padlock and it is simply not latched. I happen to be first on the call list because I live fairly close to the airport but Ron Thompson is now number two to be called and I don't think he wants to get up in the middle of the night either.

So please guys, first make sure that nothing is blocking the beam across the main hangar doors, make sure the front door is locked and then please latch the side door after you leave and before you snap the padlock closed.
