Biographical Data for William G. Martin MSG USA RET.

Birthdate/Place:December 1918, Monterey, California

Military: Enlisted November 1940 and assigned to the Third United States Infantry Regiment, Ft. Snelling, Minnesota; thence to Ft. Leonard Wood. Missouri and there, in August 1941 took a short discharge and reenlisted for the Thirty First Infantry Regiment, Post of Manila, Philippine Islands. Served as a Rifleman and Rifle Squad Leader during the Battle of Bataan, 02 Jan to 09 April 1942...

After the Defense Force of Bataan was surrendered on 09 April 1942, escaped to Corregidor Island and was attached, for rations and administration, to the Fourth United States Marine Regiment (beach defense) with duties as a rifleman/machine gunner. After the Corregidor Force was surrendered, on 07 May 1942, became a Prisoner of War of the Japanese.

Prisoner of War Experience: Was a POW for three years, three months and nine days, being held during that time in POW camps in the Philippines, Korea and Manchuria. In 1942 was in transit for 30 days from Manila to Pusan, Korea on one of the notorious "Hell Ships" .Was liberated in Mukden, Manchuria on 15 August 1945 by Russian Forces and returned to American military control on 17 August 1945. After repatriation and rehabilitation reenlisted in the United States Army and retired in September 1960.

Currently: Lives in Los Osos with his wife Lee W. Martin. Lee was a member of the WAVES from 1942-1945. Today both are active, to the degree possible, in veterans and community affairs.

Future Plans: To continue to comfort the afflicted and afflict the comfortable. And to live to be one hundred and one years of age; because, it is a once in a lifetime opportunity and, it will probably qualify him as the oldest soldier at

musters and/or reunions.

Awards: Combat Infantry Badge, Bronze Star, Purple Heart, Army Commendation Medal, Presidential Unit Citation (3), POW Medal and Campaign Medals. Rather interesting that he holds both the Philippine Defense Medal and the Philippine Liberation Medal - the latter by special order in September 1997, by them President of the Philippines, Fidel V. Ramos.

MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS' MEETING

January 17, 2001

Meeting called to order by Chairman, Glen Thomson.

Board members present: Atkinson, Chidlaw, Clark, Corippo, Cromwell, Davis Al, Marrett, Martin, Miller B., Miller C., Schade, Thomson, Toomey, Wright

1. Conrad Martin gave the Treasurer's report and recommended the board adopt an audit committee. Betty Miller and Ed Chidlaw volunteered to serve on the audit committee. Gary Corippo moved that the board establish an audit committee with Betty Miller and Ed Chidlaw serving as members, Al Davis seconded. Motion passed.

- 2. Bruce Toomey gave the Docent Report. Bruce reported the program has improved greatly with enough docents to cover the full month with a few left over as back ups. Bruce also reported that he was attempting to hold a Docent school in February.
- 3. Obbie Atkinson gave the Membership Report. Obbie and his assistants have created a draft information brochure/membership application for the Museum. It will be displayed and available to the public at numerous businesses. The board discussed membership benefits for different level members, particularly corporate members. Ed Chidlaw moved that the Museum print 10,000 brochures. George Marrett seconded the motion. Motion passed.
- 4. Marty Wright gave the Gift Shop Report and submitted the gift shop inventory, as well as the Museum Inventory and the year end donation list.
- 5. George Marrett gave the Program Report. The speaker in February will be Bill Martin. In March, the speaker will be Marty Knudsen.
- 6. Al Schade gave the Restoration Report. Progress on the Navion is slow because not enough volunteers are assisting in its restoration. The Board discussed methods of attracting volunteers and ownership of the Navion once it is restored to flight.
- 7. Bruce Toomey gave the EAA liaison Report. The EAA B-17 will be at Paso Robles Airport from April 26 through April 30. The Board discussed the Museum's involvement and suggestions were made to hold a BBQ during the visit for the EAA, the Museum and the B-17 crew.
- 8. Betty Miller gave the Visitor and Volunteer Report. For the year 2000, the Museum received

- 2,200 visitors. 100 visitors were from out of state, 20 visitors were from other countries, and 400 of the visitors were in groups.
- 9. Chuck Miller gave the Airshow Report. The Airshow is on schedule. 4 acts have already been booked and Chuck is working to increase the military's involvement for this year. The USO show will be August 25 and the Airshow will be September 9.

OLD BUSINESS

- Glen Thomson reported on the status of the kitchen hood. The Museum is waiting on city approval.
- 2. Glen Thomson reported on the library status. The walls have been completed. Once they have been painted and the carpet has been installed, the library will be complete.
- 3. Betty Miller reported on the scheduled crab feed on February 7. After discussing the high cost of crab and the number of competing charity crab feeds in the area, Marty Wright moved to postpone the Museum crab feed until next year. Ed Chidlaw seconded. Motion passed.
- 4. John Cromwell reported that safety meetings were not as well attended as the Board had hoped. John has obtained a video ground marshaling at airshows that will be made available to the volunteers for this year's show.

NEW BUSINESS

- 1. Bruce Toomey reported that submitted articles for the monthly newsletter would be appreciated.
- 2. Betty Miller reported that the Museum has 2 reconditioned interior vacuum cleaners and they should only be used inside the meeting hall, not in the hangar or restoration areas.

- 3. A BBQ for all airport tenants was discussed as a way to generate good will among all airport users. The consensus was that a BBQ would be a good idea. No date was set.
- 4. George Marrett reported that the Templeton Presbyterian Church Mens' Group was interested in touring the Museum on July 7, 2001.
- Gary Corippo suggested the Museum hold an A-4 dedication and dinner for the Navy League.
- The model aircraft on display in the Museum need identification of model type and of the model's owner.

There being no other business to come before the Board, the meeting was adjourned.

To All Members.

In view of the fact that the Flight Leader program has become somewhat disorganized, the Board of Directors has been discussing the merits of the program as it is now structured. It has been tentatively decided to change it somewhat to make it more meaningful and to provide a better mechanism of organization.

It is suggested that the program name be changed to "Wings" rather than Flights to emphasize the intention to start afresh. The Wings will be constructed to reflect what we do i.e., an Aircraft Restoration Wing, a Flying Aircraft Maintenance Wing, a Ground Vehicle Maintenance Wing etc., still utilizing the alphabetic code as at present, Alpha, Bravo etc. We would also welcome any suggestions for additional categories

It has been recommended that those who have an interest in one area or another be grouped into a Wing that is active in a certain area. This would allow new members to align themselves with a group of their choice and will also allow Wing Leaders to be in contact with their particular group for purposes of communication and specific activity events.


