Restoration

Continuing with the program that Al Schade has put into motion, we again list a couple of specific jobs that need doing on the static displays and other items.

- 1. A tailpipe cover for the A-7. This can be plywood and, as stated before, is something that could be made in someone's home shop.
- 2. Again, looking for someone who can rivet the nose cone on the F-86.

We are pleased to say that the zinc chromating of the cockpit area in the L-17 (Navion) has been completed which was the number 1 job requested in this column last month. This is the kind of response that gets things done!!

Fencing Project

We need to place some anchor fencing at the east end of the parking lot as well as the north end. In addition, the area between Thomson Hall and the Museum should also be blocked off. This would discourage visitors from wandering around the static displays before a Docent can get to them and would lead them to the main entrance to the Museum. There would be a personnel gate in the area between the buildings that would be open most of the time to give members their usual access. The gate could be closed. however, during visiting hours and during the times when a crowd is expected for an event. The other two areas are driveways and we would need a couple of fairly wide gates there for trucks and service vehicles.

This is, of course, a request for the fencing. We are looking for probably 4 foot high fencing between the buildings so it isn't a daunting barrier to guests and could either use the same size or higher for the driveway areas. These are not intended to be security fences but mainly for crowd control. Anyone who have a few sections of anchor fence and some posts that you don't need could help a great deal. We only need about 30 feet on the north, maybe 60 feet on the east and whatever it would take to go between the Museum and Thomson Hall.

Also, we need some fencing and a gate along Dry Creek Road at the east end of the main fence where that bunch of The Estrella Squadron Newsletter is published monthly as an unofficial and voluntary contribution. tangled barbed wire is called a gate. This would require the same height fence that we have out front as well as at least a single gate as wide as one of the double gates at the main entrance.

So there you have it. Another small plea for something that would be of great help.

Theft at the Restoration Building

As you will note when reading the Board Minutes, we have had a quite serious loss of valuable aircraft and engine parts from the Restoration Building. The building was broken into twice, the second time after Al Schade has placed a massive lock on the door, which was destroyed.

The items taken were pretty specific so whoever it was knew exactly what he or they wanted as far as airplane parts were concerned. This is a very unnerving situation because it indicates that the thieves know what is going on at the Museum.

Most thefts of this type on airports are conducted by knowledgeable people who either steal to order or who have a good idea of what valuable items are on hand. This is why they break into certain hangars with airplanes that have very expensive electronics mounted in them. They know just what they are after.

The thefts have been reported to the police and measures are being taken to prevent further losses. If anyone has any information as to who might be involved in these thefts we would, of course, be grateful if you could enlighten us.

Loan of Motor Home Needed for Airshow.

We will again have a base of operations near the main entrance to the Airshow where tickets will be available to our ticket sellers and where money will be accepted from them and counted. We would like to have the loan of a fair sized motor home that can accommodate several people who will be handling money and ticket sales. This will be needed by late afternoon on Saturday before the show and through the end of the show plus a little extra time. If someone would loan us a vehicle of this type we would be most grateful.

Brief Bio of Dick Blomquist

Enlisted in the US Army Air Corps May 19, 1941 as an Airplane Mechanic at Maxwell Field, Alabama. On August 10, 1942 received Flying Cadet appointment. Was awarded Pilot's Wings and Commission at Moody Field, Georgia on May 28, 1943

Next assignment was for heavy bom-

bardment: B-17's were the planes in production at that time. Crew assignment and all phases of training were completed in November, 1943. On December 7, 1943 we departed from Florida for South America. Flew from Fortalaza, Brazil to Dakar, Africa, then on to Casablanca where the crew spent Christmas, 1943. At Casablanca, received orders to

Casablanca, received orders to report to the 15th Air Force, 2nd Bomb Group, 96th Squadron, the Base being at Foggia, Italy, arriving December 31. The first Shuttle Mission to Russia completed his Combat tour of 50 Missions, Returning from overseas, married a Williamsport, PA girl Shirley, now his wife, of 57 years.

After returning from overseas, reported to the Re-distribution Center in Santa Monica, CA. Assignments following were: Biggs Field, El Paso, TX, Pratt Air Force Base, KS, Chanute Field, III.. Release from active duty August. 1944. Lived in PA 18 years, moved to VA in 1963 as a Regional Manager for Sun Electric Corporation. Retired from Sun Electric after 22 years. The last move was to Paso Robles in June 1998

Dick was awarded the Air Medal with nine Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters. The Group was awarded a Citation for the Steyr, Austria Mission on February 25, 1944.

Russia presented a Commendation Medal on the 50th Anniversary to all who participated in the first Shuttle Mission. It reads: "On behalf of President Boris Yeltsin, the Russian Government and the entire Russian people, I am pleased to inform you that you have been awarded the Commemorative Medal, the 50th Anniversary of the Victory in the Great Patriotic War". (World War II)

Shirley and Dick have two daughters, Susan Shipman, husband Ron, Rancho Cordova, CA and Cheryl Armstrong and husband Craig, Paso Robles: three Granddaughters and one Grandson.


