# MR. AVIATION OF SAN MIGUEL BARNSTORMS ONCE MORE

As a boy in the 1920s, Frank Rezich grew up with a budding Illinois air strip as his playground. His fascination with aircraft helped him land his first job as a mechanic's helper when he was just 14.

Now—almost seven decades later—Rezich will leave his San Miguel home to prepare for the 16-day National Air Tour that will take 26 vintage aircraft around the Midwest and East Coast.

For Rezich, now 80, it's a way to celebrate both his lifelong love of aeronautics and the centennial anniversary of flight.

"There is nothing like the freedom of flight," Rezich said. "You're up there, and you look down, and it's exhilarating."

From Sept. 8 to 24, the aviation veteran will co-pilot a 1929 On the Web:

five-passenger biplane in an air tour sponsored by the Aviation Foundation of America and Ford Motor Co.

As air travel grew in the 1920s, Ford Motor Co. sponsored air tours from 1925 to 1931 to advertise the advances of air travel in a time when the nation had no coast-to-coast highway.

This year's air tour is one of the events planned to commemorate the 100th anniversary of Orville and Wilbur Wright's first sustained flights near Kitty Hawk, N.C. It will follow the 4,000-mile route planned for a 1932 tour that was canceled because of the Great Depression.

A young Rezich built models of those original airplanes crafted by the Wrights.

Growing up outside Chicago, Rezich's family lived just across the street from an airport. He and his two older brothers — all mesmerized by the aircraft that surrounded them — often took a shortcut to school through the hangars, stopping to admire pilots and mechanics on the way.

Rezich learned to fly at 16. At 19, he was a foreman for a local airplane manufacturing company

"At one time we had five airplanes in our front yard," he recalls. "We must have built a half a dozen Lindbergh airplanes. Lindbergh (to my oldest brother) was God."

His childhood home has been swallowed by Chicago's Midway Airport. His grammar school was replaced by a busy terminal building.

Rezich served in the Illinois
Air National Guard during
World War II, delivering aircraft to troops in all corners of
the world. Later he worked for
North American Aviation, overseeing the production of the
first aircraft to travel three
times the speed of sound. He
also managed the assembly of
parts for Apollo 11, 12 and 13.

With experience as both a pilot and air mechanic, Rezich said he prefers fixing the planes to flying them.

Though he's officially retired.

Rezich still does consulting and repair work for "a select group of special clients." One of those is a Florida man who owns the biplane Rezich will co-pilot on the tour.

And today, when parts aren't available for 1920s and '30s aircraft, he said making repairs is a challenge he enjoys. Many of the planes he repairs are some of the last of their models.

of the last of their models.

"These are all orphans," he said. "We have to make all our own parts."

He spends many of his days in Hangar 113 at the Paso Robles Municipal Airport repairing a 1928 Travel Air three-passenger airplane that hasn't been flown in about 25 years.

He bought it for \$340 in 1940, including a spare engine and propeller. Today it stands proudly in the hangar, despite being wingless and stripped to the bare metal frame.


"We overhaul it every 25 years, whether it needs it or not," he said.

Around the plane, the hangar's walls are covered in photographs of the 29 planes his family has owned.

Even with all the experience evident in his hanger-turned-museum, life at an airport still gives Rezich a thrill. He regularly pokes his head out to see what's flying overhead.

This past June, Rezich, a member of the Illinois Aviation Hall of Fame, gave his last operable plane to his 21-year-old grandson. To him, he passed on more than a plane—he was handing down his family's legacy.


### New Business
