Restoration News

And this is big news! After weeks of incredible and sustained effort the F-4 Phantom is on it's gear! The wings have been reattached, the gear has been positioned and the big gnarly bird has been moved, at least temporarily, to the concrete pad near the rear of the Meeting Hall. Those of you who have visited the Museum during the past many weeks may have just shaken your heads when you saw the amount of work that had to be done to accomplish the above. There were parts and pieces everywhere and the cutting of the wings from the fusalage to get it here made the reattachment look like an insurmountable problem to most of us.

Our indefatigable restoration crew just dug in and began to tackle the problem and their efforts have resulted in a real bonus for the Museum. The F-4 is one tough, mean looking aircraft and is a wonderful addition to our fleet.

As a tribute to Al Schade's engineering skills a little story is in order. As you know, the wings on the F4 had to be

cut off with a plasma torch right at the fuselage for transportation. On arrival, the fuselage was raised up on supports and the wings were placed alongside on stacks of 50 gallon drums. Attaching the cut off wings was a real engineering nightmare but Al came up with the plan to utilize heavy metal plates inside the attaching point to join the two pieces together. There was some consternation and doubt as to the strength of this plan but but the work went ahead.

When the wings were to be attached some holes had to be dug so that the extended wheels could allow the wing halves to match. After the attachment was completed the crane was brought in to lift the whole thing out of the holes so it could be towed out of the dirt onto the concrete pad. The crane started to lift on one of the wings and there was some metal screetching and groaning which didn't sound too great. When the first wheel was lifted clear on the ground and the aircraft was at quite an angle it was discovered that the weight placed upon the other wing had completely collapsed the 50 gallon drums and the wing was sitting on its tip!! With this tremendous weight supported on one wing it was immediately thought that the new attachments would give way and the wing or wings would collapse.

Well, nothing of the kind happened at all. Al's superior engineering worked out just fine and ther wings held as though they were just out of the factory and the bird was towed away!! Nothing more has to be said except that we have one hell of a great Restoration Engineer!

Our heartfelt thanks go out to Al Schade, Glen Thomson, John Dolan, Jim Moody, Chuck Miller, Paul Sacks, Forrest Johnson, Gary Corippo, Fred Hahn and Conrad Martin and anyone else we may have overlooked.

On A More Somber Note

One of our founding members, Don Leedom, passed away on November 20th after succuming to Alzheimer's disease. Don and Nancy Leedom made their home in beautiful Beaufort, NC by the sea.

Don will be remembered by his unselfish gifts of time, talent and resources in the foundation and development of our Museum until his departure for the East Coast in 1995. Don, a WWII veteran was a member of the U.S. ground forces and was captured during the invasion of Germany, remaining a P.O.W. until the end of the war.

Amoung many of our early projects that Don was involved in was supervising our first restoration project, the rebuilding of a derelect Aeronca to become a flying L-16. Repair expenses were charged to Don's credit cards and these were later paid off with the formation of the present "Bug Smashers" group. After that project, Don, a pilot, teamed up with Obbie Atkinson in acquiring a 1943 Military L-2 and

participated in many early Museum fly-bys.

"Don, you will be missed and affectionally remembered by all who knew you." Our condolences go out to Nancy Leedom.

A Bit About Gary Ryan

With a high-pitched toot of the horn, Captain Gary Ryan eases Tiger's Folly II from it's dock at Morro Bay's Embarcadero. The day is warm and sunny and passengers have gathered on the top deck of the double deck paddle wheeler for an hour-long tour of the harbor.

Ryan stands in the pilot house on the fore of the ship. His nautical uniform includes a navy-blue sweater with gold epaulets and a captain's hat set at a jaunty angle atop his brown hair. His eyes appear to be perpetually ready to share a joke, even when his voice is serious.

"It was the old *Tiger's Folly* that brought me to Morro Bay for keeps in 1980," says Ryan smoothly guiding its successor, *Tiger's Folly II* toward the mouth of the harbor. "George Leage asked me to play music on his tour boat for the summer. I found Morro Bay to be like Monterey in the early 60's. I liked its small town aspects."

Ryan plays jazz guitar, banjo and piano in a style he calls, "kind of a jazzy bebop." Leage had first heard him play at the Warehouse on Monterey's Cannery Row in the 1960's. After spending 20 years on the road with the likes of Bing Crosby, Dean Martin and Rosemary Clooney, Ryan was ready for a permanent home.

Today he performs at several well-knows jazz festivals, including those in Mammoth, Monterey and Palm Springs. He also plays for special parties on the *Tiger's Folly II*, sharing his captain's duties on those and other occasions with another skipper.

Soon there is little time to talk as the captain with the elfish personality, begins entertaining his passengers over the boat's loudspeaker. He intermingles jokes with facts about the harbor and the waterfront as he pilots the 94-ton vessel toward the rolling Pacific and then returns to the quiet of the back bay.

"Gary has brought a lot of fun to a lot of people's lives," says Leage of e multi-talented crowd pleaser. "He's witty, always happy; nothing ever seems to get him down."

But, how did a jazz player become a boat captain?. The 59 year old Ryan has been a licensed airplane pilot since high school, so he says he simply "transferred" his skills and knowledge to boating and earned a license to pilot 100-ton watercraft..

Not just a captain and a musician, Ryan is a businessman too; he owns Goofy Graphics, a sign business on Morro Bay's Main Street. In his free time he likes to bike around town with his 10-year old twin grandsons. His life might not have followed the course he expected when he earned his degree in architecture from U.C. Berkeley in 960, but it suits him just fine!




