Chef John and Dedicated Crew will provide us with a delicious roast pork dinner with a special mushroom wine sauce, and all the other trimmings that they do so well.


Reservations will be necessary, as usual. Call the Museum 224-0440 or Betty Miller 466-1212.

Harrington, United States Navy Reserve, a native of Paso Robles, a graduate of Templeton School, attended Cuesta College and graduated from Cal Poly in San Luis Obispo in 1988 with a Bachelor of Science degree in **Business** Administration. He completed Aviation Officer Candidate School in Pensacola, Florida and Corpus Christi, Texas, received his wings in February 1989 and reported to Helicopter Anti-Submarine Squadron (Light) FORTY-ONE in San Diego for training in the Sikorsky SH-60B Light Airborne Multi-Purpose

System (LAMPS) helicopter. He served in Japan and Desert Storm where he flew 20 missions.

Commander Harrington also served in other capacities as an Assistant Professor at Boston University and MIT in the Naval Science Department. He was recalled to active duty in 2003 after being in the Naval Reserves from 1997 and was immediately deployed to Kuwait and then Iraq during Operation IRAQI FREEDOM.

We are very grateful to Al for picking up the pieces of the

Docent program several years ago and making it a system that really worked

After Al retired from the Museum. Jackie Brooks took up the slack scheduling Docents in addition to the half dozen other jobs she handles

Well, Al Schade always has aircraft restoration tasks and would love to have you report for these tasks any Saturday by 9:00 am. Call him at 927-8303 and find out what projects you can help with!

Yes, we are primarily an aviation-based museum. BUT we also have memorabilia that represents an important part of the lives of not only the Air Crews that flew

and worked on the aircraft, but also the engineers, drafismen, assemblers, painters. and instructors as well. Airplanes helped win the conflicts that ensure freedom, but we also honor those who slogged through the freezing snow of Russia and Korea. Those who marched through the steamy jungles of places like Corrigador, Guam, Saipan, Burma, New Guinea, Iwo Jima, or the Central Highlands of Vietnam. The brave men and women that battled the heat and choking dust of Kuwait and Iraq during Descrt Storm and the current war in Iraq, have items that represent their sacrifice as well. 103 Year Old WW II Vet Donates Uniform

Thanks to EWM Member Dick Kinsey, the Museum recently was given a complete WW II US Army uniform from 103 year old William L. Righetti of San Luis Obispo. Although stooped with age, William Righetti is bright of eye and mind, and a total delight to visit with. Since Mr. Righetti is planning on moving into a retirement community, be has decided to donate his US Army memorabilia to the Museum.

Mr. Righetti brought his uniform to the Museum and Artifact Coordinator Betty Miller placed it on one of our manikins and took a picture of Mr. Righetti next to it.


William Righetti was born on a dairy farm on San Bernardo Creek (east of Highway 1, near Morro Bay) in 1901. His father later purchased a dairy in Cayucos. where William went to Cayucos Elementary School. As a youth he went to work for Harmony Dairy in Harmony, CA. At the age of 16 Righetti was driving a Ford Model T from Harmony to San Luis Ohispo, a drive that took up to three hours each way. Very familiar with the workings of the Model T, Mr. Righetti was delighted to show how everything worked on the Museum's Model T, and was even able to recall the exact tire size and pressure for the vehicle.

As an adult, Righetti worked for Harmony Dairy in many aspects of the dairy operations. After Pearl Harbor in December of 1941, Righetti went to Camp San Luis Obispo and enlisted in the US Army at the age of 41!

Following Basic Training at Fort Ord, Righetti was assigned to the Engineer Corps and sent to an Engineer Camouflage Unit in Needles where he worked on helping to develop methods to disguise tanks and aircraft. This was necessary to protect our equipment in the deserts of North Africa where General George Patton was leading US forces against Rommel.

Righetti says his most memorable experiences were dealing with the sidewinders (rattlesnakes) in the desert! A far cry from the ocean kissed hills of Cayucos.

In 1943, the Army allowed servicemen who were over 40 years of age to seek a discharge, and Righetti decided he could be of more use going back into the dairy field to free up younger men for active duty. Upon his honorable discharge, Righetti was hired by Golden State Creamery in San Francisco were he worked for 20 years. It was while he lived in San Francisco that he met his wife of 51 years, Maria, a former opera singer. Maria passed away in 1998.







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
