For those of you who missed the arrival of our newest addition, the F-14 Tomcat fighter, on Saturday, December 11.....well, you missed a spectacular event!

From San Luis Obispo to San Miguel, everyone had a chance to see (and hear) it coming (and going!) The F-14 is a magnificent machine and a great addition to our Museum.

Many people need to be thanked for their participation in helping to make this an event that will be remembered for a long time.

Gary Corippo persevered through much red tape (and competition from other Museums) and finally convinced the US Navy to assign the aircraft to us when it was due to be cycled out of service. Thank you Gary! (As a side note, only 2 other Museums in the western US were able to qualify to receive an F-14)

The "Aircraft Retirement Ceremony" was attended by over 600 (the media placed it at 1000) enthusiastic folks who came to the Museum, lined up on Dry Creek Road, and even went over to the terminal to watch the arrival performance of the F-14. The aircraft came from VF-11 (Red Rippers) and was last based on the USS George Washington. The

pilot was LCMDR Bill Lawrence and the RO was Lt. Tim Meyers.

After a mini airshow, the F-14 landed, taxied up to our Museum taxiway where it was shut down for the last time and then was connected to our tug by Rob Kinnear and George Taylor. Gary Corippo carefully pulled it into position in front of the hangar for the ceremony.

Paso Robles Mayor, Frank Mecham (and a former member of the US Navy), LTC Kevin Brown, US Army, of Camp Roberts and myself met the pilots at the aircraft and then introduced them to the uniformed military representatives:


F-14A Arrival

As part of preparing and serving food we are required to have at least two people that have attended a state approved "Safe Serve" class which covers Commercial Food Preparation. Serving and Storage as well as legal requirements. A test is given at the completion of the class and must be passed before a certificate can be issued. Certification is good for three years, and then the individuals must be recertified. Current Certified Safe Serve staff are Betty Miller and John Himes. Ed Chidlaw has signed up for the next class which is to be held January 12. This will give us three certified members

A Better Mousetrap
