June 6: Powder Puff Derby Pilots

June Cunningham, a resident of Atascadero, always wanted to be an airplane pilot. She could not afford flying lessons so she became a singer in nightclubs and entered amateur singing contests. Not liking some of the places her manager contracted for her, she gave up singing and became a telephone operator.

Five years after marrying Sam Cunningham, a Merchant Mariner in World War II, June started taking flying lessons in the New York area. On her fourth flight she got into a spin at low altitude and fired her instructor.

She then decided to attend ground school at the Flushing Meadows Airport and got higher exam scores than most of the men in the class. This was a time when women were not accepted in aviation.

In 1960 June and her husband moved to the Bay Area and June started flying lessons again. Later they moved to the San Luis Obispo area and June entered the 1968 Powder Puff Derby as a copilot to Wanda Strasbourg in a Cardinal 177. The race was from Van Nuys to Savanna, Georgia.

In 1970 she entered the Powder Puff Derby again and this time flew as copilot with Emily Cletsoway in a Cherokee 180 from Monterey to Bristol, Pennsylvania. In 1975 June was pilot in command for the Palms to Pines Air Race with famous race pilot Joan Steinberger her copilot. They came in 13th out of a starting field of around 60 women.

Her most wonderful flying experience was the 1977 Powder Puff Derby. For that race she purchased a new Cessna 172 Skyhawk (N733RN) and owned the plane for about eight years. Shirley Moore was her copilot on that race.

June met many illustrious women pilots during her racing days. Some like Mardo Crane who wrote "Ladies! Rev Up Your Engines!" a novel about the girls in the Powder Puff Derby and others who knew Amelia Earhart. Plan to attend the June 6th museum dinner meeting and hear about aviation from a woman's perspective.

Nelson Harris passes

Nelson Harris, 75, a devoted and caring husband, father and grandfather, died suddenly Saturday, April 28, 2007.

He was born September 1931 in Joplin, Mo., where he spent the first 12 years of his life. In 1943 his family moved to Torrance, Calif. Nelson attended Torrance High School where he excelled in academics and athletics. He was cocaptain of his football team and president of student government. It was at this time where his passion for aviation took off, soloing for the first time at sixteen years old.

Upon graduation in 1948, he attended UCLA to pursue an electrical engineering degree and to play football. At the end of his freshman year, his Air Force reserve unit was called to Korea where he calibrated the Norton Bomb Sites for the next 24 months. He returned to UCLA in 1951 to resume his studies and play football. However, a broken arm on the last day of spring practice ended his gridiron career. While in college Nelson interned for Douglas Aircraft and upon graduation received a full-time position.

During the height of the space program in the early sixties, he transferred to Space Technology Laboratories, which later became TRW, in Redondo Beach, Calif. His duties included managing the design of guidance systems for various missile and satellite projects. Perhaps his greatest achievement was overseeing the design of the guidance system used on the Apollo 11 Eagle Lunar Module, which landed on the moon in 1969.

It was around this time that his passion for aviation soared to new heights by pursuing his desire to fly sailplanes. He earned bronze, gold and diamond badges for his achievements in soaring altitude, duration and distance.

In 1973 he retired from his aerospace career to pursue an agricultural endeavor. He purchased

400 acres in Paso Robles and designed a fully irrigated system to grow alfalfa and wheat. In 1990, his business career took another direction. He sold his ranch and purchased residential lots in Wasco Calif., where he developed a tract of single-family homes.

In his later years, his passion for aviation was highlighted by building his own airplane.

He is survived by his wife of 53 years Joanne; sons Vance and Grant; daughter-in-law Michelle; granddaughters Lindsay, Lacey, Ashley, McKenna and Tawny.

A memorial service was held on Saturday, May 5, 2007, at the Estrella Warbird Museum. Arrangements by Kuehl-Nicolay Funeral Home.

A lot of you did not know Nelson Harris but he has been a member since the early 90's. His wife was a Silver Bell who sang at our Christmas Dinners. Nelson bought my hangar in the Nunno complex back in 2000. He was putting together an RV-6. Everyone says that it was the most immaculate and concise airplane. He was still a pilot and flew it all the time. He was a charter member of the 'Liars" club who meet every morning at the airport terminal and have for many years. His life work was as a missile tech and was a very brilliant man. He could answer math questions with a blink of the eye.

The hard part is he died on our taxi way just east of runway 1, he was a jogger and always went from the terminal to our taxi way in front of the museum and returned. He was found about 10 am Saturday morning by an airplane taxiing from 13 to the main terminal.

The memorial was held at Thompson Hall at 11 AM on Saturday May 5th. If you can, please come and pay your respect to one of our own.




