"Thoughts From the Flight Line" Musings by the President, Peter Visel

The Estrella Warbirds Museum Board of Directors on behalf of themselves and the membership want to thank Peter Visel for his dedication and hard work on behalf of the Museum during his term of office, June 2009—June 2010. Peter thought perhaps it would be more fitting this Memorial Day weekend to use this space to remember the Veterans to whom the Museum is dedicated and leave his farewell remarks for the June dinner meeting. Memorial Day was officially proclaimed on 5 May 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand

Army of the Republic, in his General Order No. 11, and was first observed on 30 May 1868.

HEADQUARTERS GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

General Orders No.11, WASHINGTON, D.C., May 5, 1868

The 30th day of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village, and hamlet church-yard in the land. In this observance no form of ceremony is prescribed, but posts and comrades will in their own way arrange such fitting services and testimonials of respect as circumstances may permit.

We are organized, comrades, as our regulations tell us, for the purpose among other things, "of preserving and strengthening those kind and fraternal feelings which have bound together the soldiers, sailors, and marines who united to suppress the late rebellion." What can aid more to assure this result than cherishing tenderly the memory of our heroic dead, who made their breasts a barricade between our country and its foes? Their soldier lives were the reveille of freedom to a race in chains, and their deaths the tattoo of rebellious tyranny in arms. We should guard their graves with sacred vigilance. All that the consecrated wealth and taste of the nation can add to their adornment and security is but a fitting tribute to the memory of her slain defenders. Let no wanton foot tread rudely on such hallowed grounds. Let pleasant paths invite the coming and going of reverent visitors and fond mourners. Let no vandalism of avarice or neglect, no ravages of time testify to the present or to the coming generations that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and undivided republic.

If other eyes grow dull, other hands slack, and other hearts cold in the solemn trust, ours shall keep it well as long as the light and warmth of life remain to us.

Let us, then, at the time appointed gather around their sacred remains and garland the passionless mounds above them with the choicest flowers of spring-time; let us raise above them the dear old flag they saved from hishonor; let us in this solemn presence renew our pledges to aid and assist those whom they have left among us a sacred charge upon a nation's gratitude, the soldier's and sailor's widow and orphan.

It is the purpose of the Commander-in-Chief to inaugurate this observance with the hope that it will be kept up from year to year, while a survivor of the war remains to honor the memory of his departed comrades. He earnestly desires the public press to lend its friendly aid in bringing to the notice of comrades in all parts of the country in time for simultaneous compliance therewith.

Department commanders will use efforts to make this order effective.

June 9 Program— Elgen Long Author, Pilot, Adventurer

Elgen M. Long was born in McMinville, Oregon. At nine years old, his first memory of Earhart's disappearance came from selling newspapers headlining the event. With his parents' permission and the exigencies of World War II, he joined the U.S. Navy and began a lifelong career in aviation: first as a radio operator, then as a navigator, and finally as a pilot. As of this date, he has accumulated over sixty years of experience and nearly 45 thousand hours of flight.

During World War II, he flew over one hundred combat patrols in US Navy PBY and PB2Y seaplanes throughout the Pacific theatre. On the date of cease-fire in August 1945, his plane was directed to fly over all Japanese military installations on the island of Formosa (modern Taiwan) to see if the Japanese would shoot at them or honor the cease-fire. To this day he remembers thinking to himself "you have to be young and stupid to do this."

Elgen met his future wife on a blind date in Los Angeles in 1945 and the following year he and Marie Kurilich were married After 57 wonderful years together Marie passed away in 2003.

Although WWII had ended, there were still many regional conflicts throughout the world and Elgen became involved in most of them, first as a radio operator, navigator, and for 40 years as a pilot. He also became an aircraft accident investigator for the Airline Pilots Association.

In 1971 at age 44, Elgen became the first man to fly solo around the world over both Poles. The flight over the South Pole made him the first man to fly across Antarctica alone. It was the longest solo flight ever sanctioned by the Federation Aeronatique Internationale and for this feat Elgen won the Gold Air Medal in 1972. Elgen used an inertial navigation system on this flight, the first round-the-world flight over both poles using inertial navigation, and for this the Institute of Navigation named Elgen the outstanding practicing navigator for 1971. These are the top awards that can be presented for achievement in these two different disciplines.

Elgen and his wife Marie traveled the world interviewing the people still living that actually participated in Amelia's last flight. This effort resulted in the historic collection of Amelia Earhart data and interviews that now reside at the Seaword Foundation. Elgen and his wife published the book: "Amelia Earhart: The Mystery Solved" in 1999

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
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
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

One of the side benefits from all the new visitors to the Museum that day was an influx of artifacts that have been donated. We recently had nine folks successfully complete a CPR and AED class taught at the Museum by members of the Paso Robles Fire Department. These new graduates are: Margi Bauer, Rick Brandt, Ron Brooks, Sue Dollemore, Wally Engle, Forrest Johnson, Rob Kinnear, Joe Marasse, and Thom Schulz. Congratulations!

What is an "AED"? A E D stands for Automated External Defibrillator. This is a portable unit in a wall hung case and when removed and hooked up to a possible heart attack victim literally talks you through CPR and automatically diagnoses the potentially life threatening cardiac arrhythmias of Ventricular Fibrillation and Ventricular Tachycardia in a patient and is able to treat them through defibrillation. Defibrillation is the application of electrical therapy which stops the arrhythmia, allowing the heart to reestablish an effective rhythm. Your Museum now has a total of 6 AED units. They are located in the Restoration Hangar, Hangar One, Thomson Hall, Freedom Hall, The Brooks Building and the Woodland Auto Display Building. Take a moment to locate these the next time you are in one of the buildings. Your life or that of another depends on it!

Better yet, sign up for the next CPR Class on Wednesday, June 30th in the Research Library from 8 am to 1pm. Cost is \$25.00 pp and you need to make reservations in advance since we only have 5 slots available. Call George Taylor at 805-448-7402 ASAP to hold your seat!






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
