August, 4, 2010 Program— James Murphy Bataan Death March Survivor, American Hero

James T. Murphy, 89, and his son Kenneth B. Murphy, 56, recently announced the publication of their new book "When Men Must Live", which chronicles in vivid detail James Murphy's three-and-a-half year ordeal as a prisoner of war of the Japanese during World War II. The first copies of the book were released on the sixty-seventh anniversary year of the historic surrender of more than 75,000 American and Filipino troops on the Bataan Peninsula in the Philippines on April 9, 1942.

The elder Murphy, who at the time was a 21-year old radio operator in the Army Air Corps, is one of the few remaining survivors of the infamous Bataan Death March. After the surrender, Japanese commanders forced thousands of already starving and sick POWs to march for more than a week under a scorching tropical sun without food or water, covering a distance of more than sixty miles to the first of several makeshift POW camps. Thousands of Americans and Filipinos died from exhaustion, abuse and murder along the route. Thousands more who made it all the way to Camp O'Donnell at the end of the march would then die from disease, neglect and starvation at a rate of 50 every day.

"It is unprecedented have written a story like this with my father--it has never been done before. It's like I've been able to step back in time and relive his long and traumatic ordeal right along side him. There were so many challenges, mysteries and miracles that happened to him along the way that allowed us to draw out some very powerful themes and life lessons for our readers," according to the younger Murphy.

"When Men Must Live" captures many of the day-to-day conflicts these heroes encountered, contrasting good versus evil, hope and despair, and life and death through many provocative, inspirational, and often surprising anecdotes. "All this comes from the perspective of someone who defied all the odds stacked against him, even as American military leaders and politicians—as well as the Japanese POW camp commanders—predicted or plotted his demise," Murphy's son added.

"We made a promise to each other during our darkest days as POWs that if any of us should be fortunate enough to survive and return home, we would tell the story of what happened", said James Murphy. "The book honors all those who were lost and those who made it back." According to co-author Kenneth Murphy, there are additional reasons for this story being written now.

"This is not a run-of-the-mill war story. It is one of the rare personal accounts now in print that follows one man's journey throughout the entirety of World War II as a POW. My father is also one of the unique few who survived not only the Death March, but three-and-a-half more years of systematic starvation, torture and abuse at places like Camp Cabanatuan, on the so-called Hell Ships that transported POWs to Japan in 1944, and as a slave laborer—in my father's case working in a copper mine—until he was liberated a full month after the war officially ended in 1945."

It is estimated that there are fewer than a couple of hundred remaining survivors of the Bataan Death March. To James Murphy, his survival remains both a mystery and a testament of his faith and will to return home. "I was told by my captors in Japan that there were official orders directing that all POWs be summarily massacred at the moment Allied Forces landed on the Japanese homeland. I was shown actual copies of those orders at one point," Murphy recalled. "Throughout the war, there had been so many inhumane acts of brutality and murder that I knew they were capable of carrying out their promise to do away with all of us."

Anticipation of the release of this father-son publication—nearly a decade in the making—began twenty four months ago when an article containing an excerpt of Murphy's story was released at the annual Bataan Memorial Death March at White Sands Missile Test Range in New Mexico, where more than 5,000 military and non-military enthusiasts gather each year to honor those who survived or perished on Bataan. Most of those attendees participate in a 26.2 mile marathon "march" through the desert to pay a physical and symbolic tribute to those like Murphy who endured the real Death March more than six decades ago.

James Murphy currently resides in Santa Maria, California, with his wife Nancy, after serving a twenty-two year career in the Air Force before retiring as a Captain in the early 1960s, then spent the next twenty-three years working for an aerospace and missile defense contractor at Vandenberg Air Force Base. His son Kenneth is currently an author and management consultant residing in Irvine. California.

Because, life in Japanese prisoner of war camps was brutal, you should be prepared to hear some very unpleasant, perhaps horrifying, stories as James and his son describes that life.

MUSEUM MUSINGS

Summer weather has finally hit and the best time for a visit to your Museum is in the morning hours between 10am and noon! Freedom Hall is always cool, especially with the addition of our new ceiling fans which move the air conditioned cool air down to where you are walking around seeing all the new additions! Many thanks to Directors **Ron Brooks** and **Mike Kelley** for installing these! You will find that the Brooks Building is also pleasantly cool as is the Woodland Auto Display building. The only place that is toasty is outside among our great aircraft displays.

We have recently acquired some great new items, including a *complete WW I nurses uniform*! We have some wonderful uniforms that are still in storage due to the lack of large Uniform Display Cabinets. I can hardly wait until I can raise the funds needed to have another large uniform display cabinet (they run about \$900.00 each for the materials—wood, casters and glass, but we have been privileged to have the labor donated by the Central Coast Woodworkers group) Speaking of Uniforms, be sure to check out the newly displayed WW I French, German and American enlisted uniforms...these are on loan from Curator Associate & Docent, John Gramentine.

We were able to get three glass display cabinets from Jeanne Gibson who owned Gibson & Co. in downtown Paso.

I now have to get them painted and install new backs. Once completed, they will house some of our smaller artifacts, many of which are still in storage. Check us out in August to see all our latest additions and changes.

Our visitors have increased from last year. Of course the Warbirds, Wings and Wheels II event brought in some extra visitors as well. Our total visitor count through the end of June was *6288*. That is the good news. The bad news is that only *1290* were <u>paid admissions!</u> We have a great facility and we continue growing, but we still have to pay for our electricity that runs the AC and lighting, the rent to the city of Paso Robles for our 12.5 acres, and cover the expenses of restoring our wonderful artifacts including vehicles, aircraft and tanks! We had 25 Group Tours from January 5, 2010 thru June 17 which accounted for 367 paid-visitors (the smallest tour was 10 and the largest was 85.)

We are happy to announce that by Friday, August 13, 2010 all of you will have received your new **Estrella Warbird Museum Membership Cards!** As many of you are aware, most Museums include a membership card as part of your membership. As a member, one of your benefits is free admission to the Museum. Because of our increasing numbers of members, the Gift Shop workers manning the admission counter cannot remember all your names and faces. When you receive your card, turn your card over to see the benefits that pertain to the type of membership you have on the back.


