Your museum is moving forward, and the changes are coming hard and fast. Sherm Smoot, your immediate past president, and I met with city staff and city council liaison in mid-January to try to finalize the details of a new lease arrangement which will allow us to expand our facilities to the parcel to the west of our present location. City staff were very enthusiastic and helpful during our negotiations, and we should have a draft lease for our consideration by the time you read this. This is obviously good news for us as we have come to the point where we can no longer build another building and finding a place for new exhibits is becoming a challenge.

Accreditation is moving along nicely. The first of six core documents needed for approval, the Emergency Response Plan, has been drafted and has been voted on and adopted by the Board of Directors in the January meeting. We will keep plodding along with our accreditation efforts until we get recognized for what we actually are – a world class museum with great leadership, great staff and wonderful volunteers.

Speaking of volunteers, our Volunteer Department leader, Jeanne Thiebaud, along with Rich Humble, held a volunteer appreciation dinner January 13th, and many long-time volunteers were recognized for their many years of service and dedication to the museum. It was really a thoughtful and meaningful gesture put together by Jeanne's department. I can't thank you enough.

And here's an idea for a different kind of volunteer experience. Every Saturday the volunteers are fed in Thomson Hall by another volunteer. Volunteers pay a nominal amount, usually two or three dollars, and the volunteer who prepares the meal is reimbursed for the cost. Wayne Rice is in charge of acquiring the Saturday volunteer cook, so if you would like to participate, contact him and he will help you get started in this unique opportunity. By the way, if we don't get a volunteer for this job each Saturday, Wayne has to do it himself. And he will tell you himself that there is a reason the Marines never made him a chef.

If you are tempted by any of the wonderful ways to volunteer at the museum, we offer you a meeting on February 11th at 10am in Thomson Hall where you can learn all the opportunities available to our volunteers. The meeting is informational in nature, and there is no obligation, but if you want to learn what volunteers do, you have our invitation.



The first Morris automobiles were produced in 1913 by William Morris.

The first vehicles named Morris Minor, were produced in 1928 by William Morris, and became know as the 8 and 10 which represent the horsepower output. In 1937, it became Britain's largest automobile manufacturer. In 1939, they became the first to sell one million automobiles.

In 1948, after WWII, it took on the look of the model on display. These were designed to be roomy and fuel efficient. Top speed was 75 mph and rated at close to 40 miles per gallon.
