The attached photo is of the latest acquisition. It's a **1951 Austin Fire Truck**. It was built on the Austin A40 chassis with a tow behind pumper rig, powered by a Coventry engine. This was specially built to fit the narrow roads of Cheddar Gorge in Somerset, which was a popular tourist area in England. However, the roads were so narrow that standard size fire trucks were too large to navigate the roads (The Austin automobiles etc. were produced prior to partnering with Donald Healey, thus Austin Healey.)

While this vehicle appears to be complete and in good shape for its' age, it will get a major restoration. Currently, we are working on restoring the **1953 Singer (a finished product at left)** and, once completed, we will commence work on the Austin.
